

DONALD (LEE) SINGLETON

Rear Admiral (Ret.) Lee Singleton is the Provost of the Defense Security Cooperation University (DSCU), a component of the Defense Security Cooperation Agency (DSCA) and the Department of Defense's Center of Excellence for Security Cooperation education. DSCU's mission is to meet the current and future global Security Cooperation (SC) mission by providing the education, training, research, and workforce analysis required to develop an agile, certified, and experienced U.S. Government SC workforce. DSCU also implements institutional capacity building, SC education, and related programs and initiatives with U.S. allies and partners. DSCU oversees three key DSCA components: the School of Security Cooperation Studies; the Institute for Security Governance (ISG); and the Defense Institute of International Legal Studies (DIILS).

Mr. Singleton's prior posting was logistics lead for the Institute for Security Governance (ISG) where he served since January 2017. His duties encompassed all aspects of education, training, and Institutional Capacity Building (ICB) for partner nations in every Geographic Combatant Command (GCC) area of responsibility. Prior to joining ISG, Mr. Singleton served over 30 years in the United States Navy and Joint Duty assignments. His last active-duty assignment was Director for Logistics, US European Command in Stuttgart, Germany. In that role, he was responsible for formulating and executing EUCOM's logistics plans and support to operations, and the logistics Security Cooperation plans and programs. Prior assignments include director for Logistics, Fleet Supply and Ordnance for the US Pacific Fleet, Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam, Hawaii; Chief of Staff to Commander, Naval Supply Systems Command (NAVSUP) in Mechanicsburg, Pennsylvania; commanding officer of the Navy's largest Fleet Logistics Center in Norfolk, Virginia; and Chief of Staff for Director of Logistics (J4), The Joint Chiefs of Staff, Pentagon.

Mr. Singleton has an extensive background in logistics, operational planning and human capital strategy. He has held numerous senior positions in direct support to Allies and Partners. He was selected as the inaugural Multinational Logistics Division Chief for the US Joint Chiefs of Staff and represented the US Logistics Working Group to the NATO Logistics Committee and numerous NATO and Partnership for Peace (PfP) program initiatives. He has also served as the Chairman of The Multinational Logistics Coordination Centre (MLCC), located in Prague, the Czech Republic, a multinational sponsored center for all issues related to multinational logistics cooperation. Additionally, he has chaired the US working group for the Pacific Area Senior Officer Logistics Symposium (PASOLS) in support of bi-lateral and multilateral logistics cooperation throughout the Pacific. His afloat assignments include supply officer, USS George Washington (CVN 73); supply officer, USS Vicksburg (CG 69); aviation supply division officer, USS Dwight D. Eisenhower (CVN 69); and assistant supply officer, USS Vreeland (FF 1068).

A graduate of Troy University in Alabama, Mr. Singleton was commissioned through Officer Candidate School in Newport, Rhode Island. He holds a Master's in Business Administration from the College of William & Mary in Virginia, and a Master of Arts in National Security and Strategic Studies from the Naval War College in Newport, Rhode Island. He is a graduate of the Columbia University Senior Executive Program, University of North Carolina Kenan-Flagler Executive Program, and the Stanford University, National University of Singapore Program for International Management.
