This course explores the broad theme of Civil-Military Relations (CMR). The underlying focus is the need for military officers and civilian officials to develop habits of cooperation within an interagency decision-making process. The importance of developing effective civilian control of military forces is emphasized, as is the need for civilian officials to provide clear institutional roles and resources (training and equipment) needed for successful military operations, and to respect the expertise provided by military professionals.

### OBJECTIVES

Upon conclusion of this course, participants will be able to:

- ◆ Articulate fundamental concepts related to positive CMR.
- ◆ Describe the importance of positive civil-military relations in the maintenance of national security.
- ◆ Use specific skills to identify threats, assign institutional roles and missions, and develop whole-of-government responses to national security challenges.
- ◆ Develop professional networks to address shared security interests.

### TOPICS

This course uses the Institute for Security Governance's "Civil-Military Approaches to National Security Challenges" methodology to equip participants with the skills needed to identify threats, assign roles and missions of security institutions, develop ministry-level strategies, enhance interagency coordination, and develop strategic communication campaigns to ensure whole-of-government responses to national security challenges. Course topics may include:

- ◆ CMR and democratically-elected civilian control of the armed forces
- ◆ Military professionalism and institutional leadership
- ◆ All-hazards risk assessment
- ◆ Roles and missions of security forces and government institutions
- ◆ Strategic communications and public information
- ◆ Developing an action plan to enhance CMR in the partner nation

### PARTICIPANTS

Offices of Defense Cooperation and Security Assistance Offices are asked to draw participation from the widest possible spectrum of military and civilian officials from mid- to senior-level positions. Participants from academia and other civil society organizations are also welcome.

Educational programs are primarily implemented through Title 22 authorized programs, including International Military Education and Training (IMET), Foreign Military Sales (FMS), Peacekeeping Operations (PKO), and various Title 10 authorized programs, including the Maritime Security Initiative (MSI) and Regional Defense Fellowship Program (RDFFP).
